## The 2/3rd Australian Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment

Successes achieved by German dive-bombers and low-flying strafing aircraft early in W.W.II created an urgent demand for light anti-aircraft artillery to combat the menace.

The 7th, 8th, and 9th Batteries of the 2/3rd Australian Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment established in

1940 were the first such unit in the A.I.F.

The Regiment. in action, rarely functioned as a unit, but rather in Batteries with Troops scattered and individual guns often allotted separate roles acting independently. Its members, however, participated in operations in the Western Desert. Tobruk. Crete, Syria. Australia. New Guinea, the Islands and North-West Borneo.

In Crete, 7th Battery contributed to the massive losses which nearly cost the Germans their first defeat on land and casualties in that campaign exceeding in twelve days the total lost in all their

actions in the war up to that time.

Using captured Italian equipment, because their own promised Bofors guns were not available, 8th Battery participated in the Siege of Tobruk helping to thwart Rommel's plans and earning the right to

share the proud title "Rats of Tobruk".


Operating as a mobile force, the 9th Battery operated in support of British artillery, infantry and R.A.F. units in the Western Desert before moving to Syria. Following their return to Australia after Japan entered the war, they provided L.A.A. defence at Milne Bay, Port Moresby and Lae. In the subsequent Island campaign, they were present at the surrender of the Japanese in Borneo.

For the benefit of the members of the Regiment and the general reader, this book tells of the experiences of these men, often using inadequate equipment, of their recollections of those years, and acknowledges the debt so many of them owe to

the Navy.


